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SOUTH OF BROAD by Pat Conroy

This is the story of a diverse group of teenagers from Charleston, South Carolina who form friendships in the late 1960s. They are a diverse group, some from privileged families, some struggling with their place in life, some black, some white, and a brother and sister who are orphans. A basketball coach, a priest, a store owner, a psychiatrist are also among those who play major roles in Conroy's tale of drama and surprises.

Leo, the protagonist, faced mental collapse when he found his brother's body. His brother had committed suicide and it affected Leo's whole life. When we find out the reason for the suicide, it opens up a whole new world of drama.

There are many sub-plots, with each character experiencing life-changing events. The book is full of surprises, some shocking and macabre, all entertaining reading. It could be described as a "page-turner".
